GOSPEL READING: LUKE 19:28-40 The colt

By entering Jerusalem on a colt, Jesus alludes to a prophecy in which Jerusalem receives a king who brings peace to every nation (Zechariah 9:9-10). Jesus symbolically proclaims that he is that non-violent king who will reign over God's kingdom of peace.

There are two explanations for why Jesus wanted a colt on which no one had sat.

- it was customary for no one but the king to ride the king's horses
- animals used for ritual or sacred purposes weren't supposed to be used for anything else (Numbers 19:2; Deuteronomy 21:3)

The disciples vs. the crowd

It's odd that after welcoming Jesus into their city people later want to crucify him. Luke avoids this perplexing change of heart by writing that Jesus' many disciples sing for joy. The inhabitants of Jerusalem are observers and not participants in Jesus' dramatic arrival.

The king of peace

When Luke adapted this story from Mark's Gospel, he made changes that emphasize how Jesus' kingship is one of peace for the whole world and not a military advance for the Jews.

- there is no mention of hosanna nor of palm branches; both of these elements were used in Jewish celebrations of nationhood
- Luke adds peace in heaven and glory in the highest to show that Jesus' reign extends well beyond Israel; this song also recalls the host of angels who sang at the birth of Jesus (2:13-14)

Earlier Jesus didn't want his followers to publicly call him Messiah (9:20f), but now the time has come for him to confront the rulers of Jerusalem – both the religious leaders and the Romans. These rulers will reject and kill the king of peace, but that won't stop him from reigning nor will it silence his followers. Instead, all creation will praise Jesus for his gift of peace: the stones will cry out!

Jerusalem, rebellious city

Jesus' way of peace wasn't the means by which Jews expected God to free Israel. Many expected some kind of military victory. Jesus rejected this. He repeatedly warned that violent rebellion would lead only to the city's downfall (13:34f, 19:41f, 23:28f). In 70 AD the city finally did fall when Rome prevailed over a Jewish rebellion.

Fr Peter's Sunday Reflection

Dear friends in Christ, today's event ushers us into the holiest of the weeks of the church and of the year. This period stands out among all other weeks of the year. It is the time when we re-enact the salvific events of Christ for the sake of uniting us once more with God.

In the first reading, prophet Isaiah who lived 800 years ago before Christ, prophesied about the suffering servant of God who will come to put to an end the sufferings of man on account of sin, he will come to reconcile the fallen man back to his original state of sinlessness. His events will bring salvation to humanity because it is the sin of man that He bore in His body on the cross. This servant of God coming to save man is not without persecution but He never uttered a word to His executioners because He knows that His Father will not abandon Him nor let His body decay Psalm 16:10.

In the second reading of today, Paul's letter to the Philippians highlighted and reaffirmed once more the prophecy of Isaiah regarding the suffering servant. Christ who is the second person of the Trinity came in the form of man and was obedient to his Father knowing fully well that His Father will not abandon Him, though He will undergo sufferings and persecution, but He will come out triumphantly because God His Father is with Him. On account of His obedience to God, He was killed through the shameful death on the cross, but that never changed his mind towards God.

In the gospel narrative, we saw the hypocrisy of man. It was the same crowd that cheered Christ to victory a short while ago, was the same crowd that shouted crucify Him, Crucify him. That same crowd did not follow Christ to His place of execution, apart from Mary His mother, and a few other women and John, the rest deserted Him even when He needed them, including Peter the head of the Apostles.

Dear friends, the passion of Jesus should touch us, because the crucifixion of Jesus was not just brought about by the cruel soldiers of the Romans and Jewish leaders but by our own sins. Anytime we sin against God, anytime we act inhumanely to man, we sin against God, and we crucify Christ the second time. His crucifixion and death should make us flee from sin and run to Him in the sacrament of reconciliation just like Peter did and ask for forgiveness and God will welcome us back because He will not abandon His own nor let His beloved know decay. Through the passion of Jesus, we receive forgiveness, and through His wounds we are healed, Isaiah 53:5. Amen


